Through-the-Fence Operations

The Issue

There are instances when the owner of a public airport permits access to the public landing area by independent operators offering an aeronautical activity or by aircraft based on land adjacent to, but not a part of, the airport property. This type of arrangement is commonly called a through-the-fence operation. Through-the-fence operations include businesses or individuals that have access to the airport infrastructure from outside airport property, or that utilize airport property to conduct a business but do not rent business space at the airport. More common types of through-the-fence agreements are for free-lance flight instruction, aircraft maintenance, and aircraft hangars.

The Importance to Our City

The lease of airport property produces revenue that is needed for operating, maintaining and improving the airport. Individuals and businesses that are granted access to the airport from off airport property do not contribute to the airport fund. Should the off airport access allow an operator to become more economically competitive, it may reduce the ability of on-field lessees to compete for services and will diminish the economic viability of the airport.

Key Issues and FAA Standards

FAA is not "against" a through-the-fence operation, although they do strongly discourage it. There is no obligation for an airport to provide such access; rather the issue is dependent in negotiating an agreement, which will benefit the airport. If an airport allows such access, the service provided by the newcomer should include some type of compensation, similar to those paid by other business tenants at the airport. Frequently, a yearly fee, percentage of the gross profits or an access fee may be satisfactory ways of allowing this type of operation. Again, it is important that the airport operator ensure that a through the fence operator be subjected to conditions similar to those applicable to the businesses at the airport in order to avoid complications and possible violations of the grant assurances.

The development of neighboring airport property for use by an individual or firm that utilizes the airport can provide the airport additional service, or introduce "airport friendly" neighbors. ***However, the airport must contend with the legal, insurance, safety, and management implications of such access. Allowing access to one through-the-fence operator may invite future or previously denied operators the opportunity for the same privilege.***

If a through-the-fence request is being proposed, assistance can be obtained from FAA personnel or the Regional Airports Office in determining the reasonableness of any through-the-fence agreements. Ultimately, the Council will have to consider all of the pros and cons of through-the-fence agreements at the airport.

6:00 PM – Joint Work Session with City Council, Public Safety and Public Works Committees

A. LHTAC Traffic Safety Audit – 6th Avenue South / Highway 52

Doug Argo explained the findings of the safety audit conducted by LHTAC at 6th Avenue South, Highway 52 and Wayne Drive. The purpose is for safety concerns and LHTAC outlined courses of action. LHTAC contacted all those involved with the maintenance and public safety of the intersection and then conducted the study on their own. The City has opportunity to express concerns. Chief Clark said the intersection is one of our most dangerous intersections in town. There is major potential for serious injury or a fatal accident and speed is a factor. We will have a fatality – it's not if, but when. There have been accidents requiring extrication because it's a dangerous intersection. Jamie Couch said the City doesn't own the two streets/paths that go from 6th Avenue South to Highway 52. There was an accident there two days ago. He said the signage has been changed at some point, but he's not sure when and in the wintertime there are issues with cars spinning out and getting stuck on the hill. He said it's a dangerous intersection. If the street were to close Steve Castenada said a cul-de-sac would provide room for a fire truck to turn around and there is room in the Deer Meadows Subdivision. The City would have to put up dead end street signage. Councilor Heleker asked about changing the speed at Iowa and 52 and Doug Argo said the City would request the State change the speed. Chief Clark said a driver has 2 seconds to determine course of action when crossing the highway. Stan Clements said there are a lot of kids that walk down that hill. Those kids will still walk down that area. We don't have public right of way and it could be a liability issue. He said it only takes a few more minutes to go to the stop light. It's a public safety issue. Councilor Heleker said the first thing we should do is lower the speed limit. Doug Argo mentioned the parking in front of the house on the east side of the intersection. The City Council can prohibit parking along the highway. He also said the two lanes from 6th Avenue up to the highway are prescriptive right of way – we have the ability to close it or improve it. Mary Cordova said the City can address some items in the short term, but we need to start planning for the long term, budgeting, saving, etc. Councilor Hanigan said foot traffic is a huge concern as well and how do you fix that? Doug Argo said you could put a crosswalk in. There haven't been any reported pedestrian accidents at the intersection. The Mayor said the item will remain on the agenda to discuss long term solutions and we can complete some of the short term improvements now. If the City decides to make 6th Avenue South a dead-end what is the process? Doug Argo said we'd have to work closely with ITD. If we improved the intersection we'd have to buy a house

and property. We have some preliminary estimates to improve the intersection, but they are a couple of years old. Councilor Sands asked about widening the road out of town. Doug Argo said traffic counts don't warrant it. Chief Clark said closing the section would also relieve congestion at the intersection of Highway 95 and 6th Avenue South. Barb Choate said it needs to be closed and to spend 1.2 million dollars on improving the intersection doesn't make sense. Taylor Fry concurred. Council Heleker said he would like to see updated numbers on improving the intersection, not just for him but for all that use the intersection. Stan Clements said the Council just needs to make a decision, it's in their hands. Alan Massey mentioned the possibility of having a crosswalk sign. That would slow traffic down as well.

6:30 PM – Public Hearing

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, in accordance with Idaho Code 63-1311A, by the City of Payette, Idaho, that the Payette City Council will meet at 6:30 p.m. on April 15th, 2013, at the Payette City Council Chambers, 700 Center Avenue, Payette, Idaho, to consider public comment regarding the institution of new municipal fees for the Administration department for building permit fee violation.

City Attorney, Bert Osborn, read the notice and asked for public comment. Stan Clements, 9948 Ash Lane, Payette, asked if the fee will apply to someone who has made a mistake or weren't aware of the building permit requirement. Is it just for those who willfully don't get a permit after being informed of the requirement? Councilor Hanigan said the building inspector has latitude to determine applicability. Mike Phillips, 535 16th Avenue North, Payette, asked what the fees are for? Is it for the 200 square foot storage shed that is on the property line and the water run-off falls on the neighbor's property. Does it address those issues? The Mayor said the fee is 100% of the building permit cost and those affected do have an opportunity to appeal to the Council. There is additional staff time and costs associated with people who don't get building permits when their required.

The hearing closed at 6:43 PM.

6:45 PM – Public Hearing

An application by Jake & Heather Ruth for a Variance Application to the lot size requirements on a corner lot to build a 16x32 addition at 304 10th Ave No, N 99.5' of the W 69' of Lot 3 in Block 6 of T J. Lloyd's Sub. The property is zoned A- Residential.

Bert Osborn, City Attorney, read the public hearing notice and asked for public comment.

Heather Ruth, 304 10th Avenue North, owner, addressed the Council. She said they want to square off the back part of their house and by doing so would actually bring the current structure in one foot from the existing structure.

No other public comments and the hearing closed at 6:55 PM.

The work session was reconvened.

Proposed Changes to Open Burning

Fire Chief Castenada said the fire chiefs of surrounding communities would like to have the same open burning requirements as each other to promote uniformity. Malheur County has already approved it and now we're waiting on Payette County.





Heather Ruth – 304 10th Avenue North

Mrs. Ruth stated that they have an addition on the back of the house and due to the moisture it needs to be torn down. Mrs. Ruth stated that since they have to start over they want to square off the house and add a bathroom and closet. Commissioner Franklin asked Clerk Cordova to explain the variance. Clerk Cordova stated that they are on a non conforming lot and since they do not meet the 10,000 square foot they need to get a variance.

Mrs. Hassey stated that she has several friends that live in the City of Payette and they have asked her to speak on their behalf. Mrs. Hassey stated that the County had a public hearing and she wants to recap that. Mrs. Hassey stated that Mark Hiltee came to the meeting because we had heard that the Commissioners were convinced that they had to rights. Mr. Hiltee stated that he did not know who wrote the ordinance and why the P&Z would be adopting because it throws away with both hands your ability to put together a good ordinance. Mr. Hiltee advised the P&Z Committee to do away with the ordinance and the only people it is protecting are the oil and gas community and not the citizens of Payette. In addition to Mr. Hiltee's talk, Mr. Lewis from USGS advised the P&Z that it was in everybodys interest to get good data on the wells prior to them coming. Mrs. Hassey stated that already in Payette County they have a well that is contaminated with talulean. It is a private landowner across from Tuennissen farms towards New Plymouth. DEQ came in and test the well after the fact and that home owner is now stuck between a rock and hard place because she has no way to prove it was caused by the gas and oil company. Mrs. Hassey stated that she has a copy of some ordinances in Texas that she was going to bring but she has a hard time getting around right now because she just had knee surgery. Mrs. Hassey stated that she does not see and base line data requirements in this ordinance. Mrs. Hassey stated that at the county level the P&Z Committee was going to invite the community members that are familiar with the subject to the meeting so Mr. Hiltee could discuss items with them regarding LUPA. Mrs. Hassey stated that she wished Mr. Hiltee could be here today, but he had a prior commitment, but she did record the meeting if the commission would like to hear it. Mrs. Hassey stated that she has a small farm and without good water quality it is hard to get financing. She was in the finance business for a long time and potable water is a major resource when it comes to financing. Mrs. Hassey stated that there was an article that comes out today regarding injection wells. Mrs. Hassey stated that these injection wells are causing earthquakes and the one in 2011 in Oklahoma was caused by and injection well. Since Idaho is the 5th most seismically active we need to look at those items too. Mrs. Hassey stated that she thanks the commission for allowing her to talk even though she is not a Payette County resident but was asked to be here by several people.



Re: Vehicle Use Policy

BACKGROUND & JUSTIFICATION: The City of Payette's current practice regarding the use of vehicles for City business is not in written policy form. The written policy will clarify requirements and expectations of employee conduct and responsibilities while operating a City vehicle or on City business.

The City's liability insurance carrier, ICRMP, has recommended the City adopt a vehicle use policy.

During their meeting of April 25, 2012, the Administration and Finance Committee reviewed and recommended City Council approval.

FISCAL IMPACT: None.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve the City of Payette Vehicle Use Policy.



CITY OF PAYETTE

ADMINISTRATIVE POLICY

SUBJECT:	Vehicle Use Policy	EFFECTIVE DATE:	05/06/2013

PURPOSE:

- A. This Policy outlines the use of vehicles for work used on behalf of the City of Payette.
- B. Operators of City of Payette owned or leased motor vehicles shall always drive safely, legally and courteously, remembering that they are directly responsible for maintaining both City of Payette owned property and public trust.
- C. Employees are expected to operate vehicles safely. It is the policy of City of Payette to provide a safe working environment that protects our employees and our citizens from injury and property loss. The City of Payette considers the use of vehicles part of the working environment. The City of Payette is committed to safe responsible employee driving behavior that reduces the risk of personal injury and property loss.
- D. This policy applies to all employees and agency volunteers* who operate vehicles on agency business. These drivers will be referred to as "employee drivers" and will be reviewed by managers and supervisors to ensure full implementation and compliance.

*Volunteers are those that volunteer on a regular basis, not one-time volunteers.

USE:

- A. Vehicles owned or leased by the City of Payette are to be used for the functions of the City of Payette. Personal use or any other type of use must be authorized by the governing board.
- B. Each Department Head is entrusted with the care and keeping of the vehicles and may assign that responsibility to an employee.
- C. Some employees may be assigned a vehicle that is driven home; such personal use, if allowed, may be a taxable benefit.

Agency Owned Vehicles

Employees must be authorized by their supervisor to operate an agency vehicle. Vehicles over 26,000 gross vehicle weight, Buses, and Vans over 15 passengers require a commercial driver's license (CDL).

Personal Vehicles on Agency Business

Employees who drive their personal vehicles on agency business are subject to the requirements of this policy including:

- Maintaining auto liability insurance with minimum state limits;
- Providing proof of liability insurance to the Department of Administration on an annual basis.
- Maintain vehicle in a safe operating condition when driven on agency business.
- Document miles driven for City business for eligibility of reimbursement per the Internal Revenue Service mileage reimbursement rate.

ASSIGNED OR PERMISSIVE DRIVERS:

- A. Each employee assigned to a City of Payette vehicle or employees who operate a City of Payette fleet vehicle are required to have a valid driver's license. Should an employee's Driver's License expire, be revoked or suspended, the employee shall immediately notify his or her supervisor. At the time of the suspension, the employee's vehicle-use privileges will be suspended until the employee's Driver's License has been fully restored and validated.
- B. In addition to the employee assigned or permitted to drive a City of Payette vehicle, he or she may allow others, as necessary, to operate the vehicle if they have a valid driver's license and are 25 years of age or older.
- C. Each employee assigned or permitted to operate a City of Payette vehicle shall be responsible for the following:
 1. Proper and safe operation of the vehicle;
 2. Service and maintain the vehicle in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations;
 3. Maintain vehicle registration, license plates and inspections; and
 4. Participate in vehicle safety and defensive driving training as required by the City of Payette.

DRIVER EVALUATION:

Employees will be evaluated and selected based upon their driving ability. To evaluate employees as drivers, management may:

- A. Review past driving performance and work experience through reference checks with previous employers.
- B. Review the employee's Driver's License Record (DLR).
- C. Ensure the employee has a valid driver's license.
- D. Ensure the employee is qualified to operate the type of vehicle he/she will drive.

SEATBELT USE:

Except as authorized herein, all drivers and passengers are required to utilize seatbelts as

mandated by law. Exception: Sworn law enforcement officers may dispense with wearing safety restraints in specific tactical situations or when it reasonably appears that, due to unusual circumstances, wearing a seatbelt would hinder rather than increase safety (Idaho Code 49-673(2)(b)).

MOBILE COMMUNICATION DEVICE, CELL PHONE AND COMPUTER USE:

The driver of a City of Payette vehicle, or any other vehicle being used for City of Payette business, is *prohibited* from using a mobile communication device, cell phone or computer of any type while the vehicle is in motion. Drivers must be safely parked before using phone or mobile computer equipment. A mobile communication device is defined as “a text messaging device or a wireless, two-way communication device designed to receive and transmit voice or text communication”. This does not apply to City of Payette work-related two-way radios. Exception: Sworn law enforcement officers may use mobile communication devices in specific tactical situations.

SMOKING PROHIBITED IN VEHICLES:

Smoking is expressly prohibited in or on all City of Payette vehicles.

IMPAIRED DRIVING:

The driver must not operate a vehicle when his/her ability to do so is impaired or influenced by: alcohol, illegal drugs or other illegal substances, prescribed or over-the-counter medication, or illness, fatigue or injury.

The employee driver is obligated to report to his/her supervisor any reason that may affect his/her ability to drive safely.

PROOF OF INSURANCE:

Employee drivers must make sure that the current insurance card is kept in the vehicle at all times.

ACCIDENT REPORTING:

- A. In the event of an accident, the driver shall, when possible, first check on the safety and welfare of all persons involved and seek immediate medical attention should it be required for themselves or others. If possible, move the vehicle to a safe location out of the way of traffic.
- B. Drivers shall always have a police officer investigate any accident that involves a City of Payette vehicle. This will help ensure that the City of Payette is protected from unwarranted claims. Do not discuss fault with, or sign anything from anyone except for a police officer, a representative from ICRMP or an authorized representative of the City of Payette.
- C. Drivers shall notify their supervisor as soon as possible of the accident and report the extent of the injuries and property damage involved.
- D. Drivers shall cooperate fully with ICRMP Claims Department in the handling of the claim.

TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS:

All fines and other criminal penalties due to violations of the law by the driver are the personal responsibility of the driver of any City of Payette vehicle. These costs are not reimbursable by the City of Payette and must be paid promptly by the driver.

VEHICLE MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR:

- A. If the City of Payette vehicle is in need of repairs, the issue shall be reported to the Department Head who is responsible for the care and maintenance of the vehicle.
- B. Prior to scheduling major repairs or major maintenance needs, the driver must advise Department Head of the necessary repairs and for approval.

VEHICLE ASSIGNMENT AGREEMENT

The undersigned hereby acknowledges receipt of an agency-owned or agency insured vehicle. I understand that this vehicle is to be regularly maintained and serviced, according to the service schedule outlined in the owner's manual or the instructions issued by the Fleet Safety Coordinator, whichever is appropriate.

Further, it is agreed this vehicle will be operated in a safe manner and in compliance with this policy. I agree to be responsible for all traffic and parking violations that occur while the vehicle is assigned to me.

I understand articles of this agreement apply regardless of who is operating this vehicle.

I agree to promptly report all accidents or incidents resulting in injury or damage to the vehicle or other property, no matter how slight.

I understand I am required to maintain a valid driver's license. Further, I herewith grant _____ the right to investigate my driver's license record any time. My current driver's license is issued from the State of _____ and is License Number _____.



OLD BUSINESS

- A. Arbor Day – April 26th: We will be stuffing bags at 10:00 am on April 25th at City Hall for the classroom at 1:15 pm set-up with Ms. Thompson class. We will be planting two trees (possibly Vanderwolf Limber Pines) at Kiwanis Park Riverside on April 26th at 1:30 pm. The Commission needs to be there by 1:15 pm. The Rebekah Lodge #22 donated \$50.00 towards Arbor Day. A Thank You note will be sent to them.

NEW BUSINESS

- A. Trees in City Right of Way: Commissioner Gray addressed City Attorney Bert Osborn and stated that we have worked 14 years on the ordinance on hazard trees. We have 3 ISA certified arborists, 3 master gardeners, one retired science teacher and one retired City park employee on the Commission, all with a lot of experience and knowledge. In February 2012 we asked how to send letter to the public per code to take out hazardous trees and we followed your advice, then at the last council work session they said not to send out letters anymore. Four letters were sent out as directed and all the owners took out the hazardous trees on their own. The liability the City would suffer is great and we are just trying to keep the City out of trouble. Some trees look healthy that may not be. Since we started sending letters and now have stopped, where do we stand? Mr. Osborn stated we need to keep going, first you need to go to City Council and convince them. Ms. Cordova asked if we have staff and budget to do this. The City has not budgeted anything if the owners don't take them out and we have to hire someone to do it. Commissioner Van Patten stated the issue is if something does happen, in his opinion we need to have a policy and plan to get the worst ones first. Down the road we would spend more on a lawsuit. Ms. Cordova stated that we did have one that did cause an accident and they tried to sue the City. Our code stated the property owners are to maintain the right-of-way, not the City. We need to have funding and plan for it; if the owners don't have then we have to absorb the cost. Commissioner Bronson stated if we have an ordinance and we are not going to enforce it, then we need to change the ordinance. The Commission asked Mr. Osborn if we have the ordinance enforce and we don't enforce where we stand. He stated that it doesn't make a difference; our code stated that it is the property owner's responsibility to maintain the right-of-way. Ms. Cordova stated that it is no difference than our weed ordinance. We enforce as situations arise, it is difficult to find every property that is not in compliance. If the property owner doesn't take care of their weeds we have to hire someone and then place a lien on their property. Mr. Bronson asked if the City Forester is supposed to look the other way. We need to advocate to City Council to budget for this. Mr. Fales stated he can find time to identify hazardous trees. The Commission discussed the Forestry line item in the Parks budget and it was stated that we use some of that for Arbor Day. Mr.

Gray asked the Commission what is the pleasure of this group? The City is starting their budget discussion for next year's budget now. The Commission would like to go to City Council and ask that money is budgeted for hazardous trees. Something will be prepared for the Council and Mr. Bronson will attend on behalf of the Commission. Ms. Cordova stated that the Street and Park Departments will be asking for a bucket truck to be used by both departments and advocate for this as well.

GENERAL DISCUSSION

Commissioner Van Patten asked about the grass at the library. It was stated that landscaping will be completed after the amphitheater is completed. A tree has been removed on the southeast corner and it will be replaced with another tree. There will be diagonal parking constructed along 1st Avenue South as part of the project. Mr. Fales stated that there will be chain link fencing around the trees planting last year during construction. The Commission recommended putting plywood down or expanding the area three times in diameter around the trees.

A. Pool Update:

The proposed rates were passed out to the committee for swim lessons and admission to the pool; the rates discussed here would go to a public hearing first, and then passed to City Council, a discussion followed. 2. Unattended Children Policy- A policy was handed out to the committee, Cordova stated that they are looking at how old should the kids be to be at the facility by themselves; she was speaking to Dave Freeman and he says there is no law, but the standard is usually 10 years or older, a discussion followed. The consensus of the committee was to add a 'swim-test' to the policy. Cordova stated that we can bring this back to another meeting.

B. Parks Update:

Randy Fales informed the committee that he and his department have trimmed all the roses and most of the trees. We have grass planted at the library and are just trying to keep everything trimmed up to make sure our parks are looking good. Jeff Sands asked about the Soccer guys playing at Gateway Park on the weekends, Fales replied that the Payette teams have been doing an

excellent job cleaning up everything at the park.

1. Greenway Update- Belinda McFarland, daughter of John Weaver, came in to give an update to the committee, stating that she went for a walk yesterday at the Greenway and met up with a friend who has told her that there is a problem with people fornicating in the Centennial Park. McFarland stated that she did not see any kind of signage for the park being closed.
