A work session of the Payette City Council was called to order at 6:02 PM by Mayor Jeff Williams in the City Council Chambers of Payette City Hall, 700 Center Avenue.

ROLL CALL

DEPARTMENT REPORTS

1. Street Department – Mr. Couch stated that his department just finished chip sealing and painting lines on the City streets, they also will be starting on the light poles. He stated they will be starting a curb & gutter project over on North 4th Street and just finished their portion of the Iowa project. Ms. Dale asked Mr. Couch if he had 5-year plan and a list of goals. Mr. Couch stated yes
2. Water Department- Mr. Hust stated his department has been doing a lot of meter pit maintenance, mowing of the reservoirs, updating to radio meters, gathering samples, helped the Street Department with chip sealing, and keeping up on the normal day to day work orders.
3. WWTP Department- Mr. Schwartz stated his department just completed reinstalling a race pump. The received bids for the sewer replacement project on 1st Avenue South and HWY 95. They put a building up at vista air lift station to add another oxygen molecule to that pressure main. Other than those projects there are the daily work orders, testing, and collections.
4. Park Department- Mr. Fales stated his department has been very busy keeping water on all the grass in our City Parks. They have gone through a pallet of ironite to keep our grass green and healthy. There are a lot of trees within the City that are hanging down right now due to a lot of fruit, but they will be trimming them soon.
5. Pool Department- Mr. Fales spoke on behalf of the Pool. He stated that last week the boiler had a rollout, and when it gets plugged up the igniter will not work, it needs to be on a cleaning routine. Mr. Massey asked what are the pool temps staying at? Mr. Fales stated currently it is around 79 degrees at 6am in the morning, but he doesn't check it during the day. Ms. Dale asked if the boiler needs maintenance more, to prevent a rollout. Mr. Fales stated having repairs or maintenance every 90 days, would help prevent that issue. Ms. Dale asked if the maintenance is done every 90 days, will it prevent the pool being closed down an entire day for repairs. Mr. Fales stated yes it would prevent that. Ms. Dale asked about the current solar heating system and how it is holding up. Mr. Fales stated that there are some cracks and it is in need of repair.

Ms. Dale wanted to know the current status on the pool hours and hiring or lifeguards. Mayor Williams stated that the Pool did a lifeguards' certification class and there were 7 in attendance and we have since hired two,

6. Shop Department- Mr. Franek was not in attendance.

FUTURE MEETING TOPICS

Sherri Schuster, 10237 Payette Height Road Payette, ID- Ms. Schuster addressed the Council and stated after returning from vacation, she learned the Pool hours has again changed and still can't take her daycare kids to the pool. There are people who want to use this pool, but can't if the pool is closed. She doesn't understand it, nor does it make any sense to her. Mayor Williams stated there is a group of people that wanted the pool open in the mornings, so after meeting with the pool staff they changed the hours to help the community by keeping the pool open to appeal to them as well. The City has increased the lifeguards' wages, hired more guards, but only have so many to keep the pool open. We at the City will make it whole with any patron that has purchased a pool pass. All she asks is to come together as a community to save this pool.

Mr. Wickersham stated that the Council doesn't want to see the Pool close down.

Ms. Dale stated that this Council wants this Pool to work and stay open, but wants the community to understand that their hands are tied. Ms. Dale asked Mayor Williams if he would be comfortable to appoint a few Council members to help resolve this issue to pursue finding someone to fill the position of Pool Manager. She knows of a few Council members willing to volunteer their time to find this person, because City staff doesn't seem be able to have the time to accomplish this. This community does deserve that. Ms. Dale stated as a Council member she feels responsible to help resolve this.

Ann Schiemer Fitch, 1176 Locust Way Ontario, Oregon - Ms. Schiemer addressed the Council and stated that when she was interviewed for the Pool Manager position, she was asked one questioned that really disturbed her. The question was, Are you a team player? Ms. Fitch stated she is absolutely, but she thinks in this problem they have forgot that one of the team members is the citizens of this community, and that you are here to serve those people. Both those who are elected as well as hired. The City employees are hired to protect the public and services in such a matter that is satisfactory for this community. Ms. Schiemer is disappointed in this town, we don't want to take care of the City nor do we want any new businesses. If it takes a \$1,000,000 bond to save this pool, then it needs to be done. You can Band-Aid the pool to cover up the problem or fix it entirely.

Liz Amason, 490 North 20th Street Payette, addressed the Council and stated that St Luke's has a Community Health Improvement Fund grant that is due by the September 30th, 2016, and possibly those funds can help rehabilitate the pool. Ms. Amason is more than happy to help with this grant.

PLEDGE

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mayor Williams.

PUBLIC HEARING FOR BUDGET

Bert Osborn conducted the public hearing.

Ms. Cordova handed the Council copies of the slideshow presentation. Ms. Cordova informed the public that the current tentative budget is \$ 9,446,737. Ms. Cordova stated that we will have a slight decrease in property tax revenue and our employees' health insurance premiums has will decreased. Ms. Cordova informed the public that the elected officials are in charge of the levying the property tax rate. We do not have any control on what the State gives us in revenue sharing, so the Council determines your City levy rate. Ms. Cordova stated that the majority of the general funds go to the Police Department which is roughly 43%, then Fire Department, Administration, Parks Department, Code Enforcement, and Legislative & Executive. What are our priorities the next budget year?

Ms. Cordova stated that the Council has embarked on a strategic plan to what our City future holds in the next 5 years. The Council's goals are to invest in resources and strategic focus on initiatives that will generate awareness and broaden economic opportunities for this community. The Council is trying to build the budget around the mission statement. Goal # 1 is to facilitate economic development to revitalize the community. Ms. Cordova stated the Council has created a new department in the budget called Economic Development. In this funding is a paid position, that will be meeting goals that is in the strategic plan as well as general marketing. Goal #2 is customer focus. They are wanting to create partnerships with the citizens to ensure their success. Goal # 3 is a future for growth in our youth. The Council wants to ensure that the future generations can enjoy opportunities to live and work in Payette, by forming partnerships with organizations that support growth.

Ms. Cordova stated that each Department tells the Mayor their goals that would they would like to accomplish with next year's budget. In the Administration department some of our goals are working on an innovative government by increasing customer satisfaction, fiscal sustainability and strategic investment in making sure the budget is structurally balanced, incorporating long term financial planning, increasing our operational efficiency through technology, seeking out & fixing processes that don't work and making sure that our staff is trained to provide great customer service to our patrons. The Police Department has 14 certified officers; one officer is grant funded through the Idaho Department of Justice and is focused to be community oriented. There is one year left with that position. Along with the 14 certified officers the department has one code officer, and one administrative support. Chief Clark is only asking for one new police car, one replacement engine for another car and basic equipment. The Fire Department is asking for a Type 6 Brush Truck. Mayor Williams asked Chief Castenada to explain what a brush truck is. Mr. Castenada stated that there are over 700 acres of fields in the rural area and we are in need of this truck. Ms. Cordova stated that in addition to the brush truck, Mr. Castenada is saving for a new engine. There is a position for a part-time employee to continue service in the rescue program.

The Parks Department, has over 50 acres of parks. Their budget includes a dog park, replacing the floor at the band shell and a drench the pond at the greenway. The Street Department would like to improve River Street, replace, widen and improve other streets, purchase a new Street Sweeper, purchase a new Paint Striper, and hire on an additional full-time employee. Mr. Couch stated every year that he has to retrain someone to run the Street Sweeper. This has been a seasonal position and we've lost people over the years. He would like to see one full time employee designated as the street sweeper during the summer, then work the rest of the year. Ms. Dale stated that we need to factor in the time it takes to train someone. Mayor Williams stated we can use this person not only for street jobs, but other maintenance around the City. This person is already in the budget. Ms. Cordova stated

that Shop Department is wanting the normal tools and supplies to keep the City running, and is in need of a new shop. The current shop isn't big enough to work on our bigger pieces of equipment safely. Ms. Haley, Library Director, spoke on behalf of the Library. The Library is wanting to increase the book and technology budget, to accommodate the volume of patrons coming through the door. Ms. Cordova stated that in the Library budget from last year they added a full-time employee, so currently the Library has 4 full-time and 1 part-time staff. There currently is \$7,000 in the budget for information technology, they are looking in purchasing a projector and some privacy barriers. Ms. Cordova stated that for the Pool there is \$20,000 in the budget for a needs assessment, to hire a professional to come observe our pool and determine how to update the pool. There is money in the budget to resurface the indoor pool and purchase additional lockers for the locker rooms. Ms. Cordova stated that the Airport has the runway extension project out to bid this week, some of the funds will be spent this fiscal year to prevent going over into the next year budget. There is \$25,000 marked for a bigger fuel tank. Jake Hust, Water Supervisor, spoke on behalf of the Water Department. The Water Department has a couple big projects coming up, redoing River Street, updating to bigger water lines on 3rd Ave North, roof maintenance and rehabs on shops, reservoirs and well stations, and updating the City to radio meters. Currently 25% of town is done. Randy Schwartz, WWTP Supervisor, spoke on behalf of the WWTP. The WWTP Department will be working on some crossings of 1st Ave South and Center, purchasing a new Vac Truck and looking for a new person to add on to staff, due to Mr. Schwartz retiring. Ms. Cordova stated due to a franchise agreement with Hardin Sanitation the Sanitation fund will not be changing. In the Revolving Loan fund there is still a lot of funds in there for façade grants. Ms. Cordova stated that the City will be expending funding from the Impact Fee fund for the Fire Departments brush truck equaling \$12,043, & \$9,000 for Police equipment. Ms. Cordova stated that there is a 3% wage increase in the budget, The City's workers comp went down 38% because employees are working safer. There is a decrease in health insurance by 15%. The insurance is no longer age defined but the employees are now grouped as a composite. Ms. Cordova stated the Mill rate the way it is budgeted right now with the property tax as in the tentative budget, we are looking at 11 Mills. Mr. Nelson asked Ms. Cordova to explain the 3% new construction and foregone. Mr. Nelson asked how much is in the foregone? Ms. Cordova stated she doesn't have an exact estimate but roughly \$80,000, and if the Council decides to use it or keep for the next fiscal year we need to hold a public hearing on that. Ms. Dale was confused that if foregone was a revenue why wasn't it listed. Ms. Cordova stated that you won't see it in your actual budget just the levy calculations.

Mike Campbell, 2072 Center Avenue Payette, addressed the Council, he had a few questions that he wanted to clarify and understand better. Mr. Campbell asked about the 15% increase in the overall budget. He wasn't sure where that extra 15% was going. Ms. Cordova explained there is a 3% wage increase for the employees, there was a projected higher amount for insurance but it has gone down 15% and this budget in front of you doesn't reflect that. He asked about the Economic Development fund and the \$80,000 for that line item. Ms. Cordova stated that the Council put in \$50,000 for a contracted position, then \$20,000 to meet the goals of the strategic plan and then another \$10,000 for general miscellaneous expenses. Mr. Campbell asked about the Airport and \$25,000 for the new fuel tank, and why do we need to spend that much on a tank. Mr. Osborn stated with bigger tank for the Airport it is the easier to get refilled and offer more gas to pilots, which could increase revenue.

Ms. Dodson spoke on behalf of the City's employees' wages verses wages in the surrounding areas. Ms. Dodson stated that after doing this research the Council needs to consider raising base wages to retain our assets.

Chief Clark stated that it is important to keep our current staff and take care of them. He penciled out what it cost to train and hire a new officer. Clark stated that the cost of hiring on a new officer is \$18,000. Mr. Clark stated that the City should offer insurance, that is a good reason as to why people want to work for the City. It is important to invest in our employees. The City's starting wages are below everyone else in the surrounding areas and you can't blame people for leaving, when they have to provide for themselves.

Mr. Schwartz stated that with him retiring the City is now looking at hiring a Class 3 Waste Water Operator, for which the minimum amount of time to acquire is 7 years. There are hours logged, tests taken and certifications that are required. Mr. Schwartz stated that he has two guys right now who have been with him for a few years that make less than the starting wage over at Fruitland.

Chief Castenada stated it is hard to ask for a wage increase when he is asking for such big ticket items, but like Mr. Clark & Mr. Schwartz he said we need to invest in our employees.

Mr. Hust stated that in the Water Department all employees are required to keep up on your licenses and certifications and they are not easy to get. When a potential employee sees a dollar an hour more figure across the river with the same requirements we can't compete. Mr. Hust stated we are trying to train our next generation, if we can't keep them we won't go anywhere.

Mr. Couch stated that like everyone else said you have to treat and take care of your employees right. We have to be competitive to keep someone.

MAYOR'S COMMENT

Mayor Williams wanted to let Ms. Dale speak on the topic she requested to talk about earlier.

Ms. Dale stated that she never wants the impression sent that the Council doesn't appreciate our employees. The Council walked into this budget year being told that our assessment values were going to be considerably low, and that we were going to have to make up somewhere else. She is resistant to a flat 5% across the board for all employees. Some employees deserve more of a raise and some simply don't deserve a raise at all. The problem with that scenario is how to you determine who gets a raise and who doesn't. The Economic Development position and the reasoning for the \$80,000, is they had to put as much money in that line item as possible while the Council waits for the survey results to come back. She wants your input on how to keep your guys.

Ongoing certifications should warrant raises and those are the incentive that employees need. Ms. Dale wanted to let staff know that they are appreciated in all the hard work they do.

Mr. Wickersham wanted to state not only are they dealing with the employees, but the public too and keeping the levy rate down.

Mr. Massey talked about the benefit package and that is one of the many reasons people like to work for the City. Mr. Massey stated we do appreciate our employees and step raises should be in place.

Mayor Williams asked the Council when they would like to have another work session. A special meeting of the Payette City Council was called to order at 4:00 PM by Mayor Jeff Williams in the City Council Chambers of Payette City Hall, 700 Center Avenue.

ROLL CALL

AGENDA ITEMS

- A. Award Iowa/Center Avenue Project: Mayor stated the City had put out bids on the Iowa/Center Avenue Project and we had a bid that meant all the criteria and would be the preference to approve now and might be able to be done in this budget year. Durham Gravel Works submitted a bid and most of the work could be done this year and the balance in next year's budget. Nelson asked if this was the only bid we received and was stated yes. Jensen asked what was in this budget year for this project. Cordova stated this includes 3 projects, Center to Iowa Avenue that portion is \$340,948 and \$130,000 is in next budget year. Second project is replacing pressure reducing valve (PVR) and third is to extend sewer lines on 7th Avenue North. The PRV and water/sewer lines are out of water and sewer funds. Massey stated that the contract only states one. Cordova states other two were bid alternates, but the main title was bid out as Iowa Avenue Road. Dale stated she is not comfortable with that. It was bid out as Iowa, but somewhere there are two more project not listed. Cordova stated we did that in case it was to cost prohibited to do all three projects. Jensen asked if total amount includes all three projects, and Mayor stated yes. Massey asked about carrying over the project. The Council discussed about having it in capital outlay on line 760 and it shows being budgeted for. Dale stated this is what is wrong with budget, it is wrote as River Street. Mayor stated the budget does show the two projects. Cordova stated majority of water/sewer will be out of this year's budget. Jensen asked how much coming out of this budget year for water/sewer. Cordova stated around \$70,000 for first portion and alternate \$110,000 between both departments.

A motion was made by Nelson and seconded by Jensen to award the Iowa/Center Avenue project to Durham Gravel Works, Inc., not to exceed \$457,444.90.

At the roll call:

agreed. Maybe find a way to finance someone, that might be able to work on a percentage. We need someone that can work on grants also, and it was never designed to be a full time person Dodson stated. Massey stated to create more opportunities for us, we have to put a place holder in budget. Maybe someone in office can do some of this and shuffle duties. Nelson stated his thoughts, with staff being overworked, then saying maybe now they have to take on more duties. Mayor stated SREDA is to market the area, not to close the deal. You are not going to hire someone for \$50,000. Mayor stated the land south of fire station, we could market that area. We have a lot of amenities and that need to be marketed. Dodson thought we would hire an agency. Wickersham stated maybe train staff that might show an interest. When scope of work is done that might give us some direction. Jensen thought we were doing this for someone who would take person through each step. Massey stated now we are putting money in budget so we can move forward. Dale asked about being named Economic Development, maybe have it as Strategic Plan?? Massey discussed the amount of unencumbered funds being used and that doesn't leave us a lot of reserves. He is concerned that we are not replacing and wants to know how many projects that we are using unencumbered funds for and maybe they can be split between 2018 budget, so not bringing reserve down so low. Jensen understands where Massey is coming from, and is wondering if some of these projects can be delayed and not raising levy rate. The Council asked if River Street could have some out of 2018. Dale asked about individual projects amounts. Mayor stated when he first came on, our reserves were 50%-80% of annual expenditures. The accountant says if have 25% to 30% in reserves you are healthy. We are showing 26% in budget. We carry some funds over ever budget year. Nelson stated if don't use funds then we raise levy rate or reduce projects. Dale asked about Street Department hours for runway extension project. Cordova stated a lot is from volunteer hours. Wickersham asked if we ever got County to commit to anything for the airport and was stated nothing. Jensen would like to see if levy could go down more. Jensen asked about dog park and dredging pond, can we delay until next year. Jensen stated going on CPI for wages is at 1% and if we do 2% instead of 3% and he talked to airport about tank and Koeppen stated it wouldn't hurt his feelings if wasn't in budget year. Massey stated \$25,000 would cover entire cost of tank. The cost of fuel would be 50 cents less to buy and we wouldn't run out of fuel for eight weeks. Jensen would like to trim it \$40,000 - \$50,000 to lower levy rate. Mayor asked Jensen what is a realistic levy rate for him? Jensen stated he always had a problem with over 1%, would like to have .099999. Mayor asked what would we have to trim with the library bond to get to that?? Cordova stated \$68,000 would have to be trimmed. Nelson stated that is tax money, not unencumbered. Mayor asked Couch about full-time person and a part-time, could he do away with part-time. Couch stated they are trying to do more in house, like storm drains, curb and gutter. They are doing okay, but it is tight, and in order to keep doing what he does he will have to have more staff. Mayor asked what do we really want to keep and what do we want to give up. Dale stated not do the River Street project, let him have his extra guy and next year can bump up wages to be competitive. Wickersham stated one of the things we need to look at are the guys at the top get all the money and then guys at bottom don't get as much. Mayor stated that can be decided after approving budget. What if Weaver & Associates comes in and says our wages are all low. Nelson stated he thinks the 3% is needed. Top tier needs just as much as the low, they are the most seasoned and we need their expertise. The Council asked if the library's, expenditures and revenues all get resolved. The Council discussed putting \$12,500 for fuel tank and we have something in budget. Jensen asked if anyone had heartburn with removing dog park and dredging of pond. Dodson stated the pond was part of a match. Dale stated to use Padgett Park as the dog park, it is already fenced and we own that park.

Fales stated it could be done, we would have to make sure we could get equipment in. Nelson asked if airport ever approached local companies to do some revenue sharing for bigger fuel tank. Mayor stated he has been talking to Idaho National Guard and they would lease armory for \$2,400 a year and recruiter would have an office available to them. There would be utilities to be paid if utilized the building. Wickersham asked about size of shop and could Franek utilize some of the space. Dale asked how long of a lease and Mayor stated he doesn't remember at the moment. Wickersham would even be willing to trim \$10,000 on Economic Development to help with tank at airport. Mayor ask if consensus of council is to have tax levy at .0999. Couch hears airport is self-sufficient, but had a guy out there all day spraying weeds. Jensen stated we can cut some funds out of the capital outlay items, and don't mess around with personnel. Dale asked about River Street, Couch stated it is in conjunction with water line and sewer lines. Dale stated we might have to delay both projects. If closer to beginning of budget year than have over two budget years. Mayor asked Hust about water flow to school. He stated the hydrant doesn't have adequate water flow. Massey asked about scheduling between two budgets, we could lower some of the dollar figures. Cordova stated it was coming from reserves and it is over two years now. Jensen asked if we could delay some of the equipment like the sweeper. Couch stated every year there is more maintenance on the old sweeper. Couch stated other cities have problem with them also. Nelson stated he doesn't have a problem dropping fuel tank, and Dodson stated there are other things we can do. We have to have increased inventory for growth. Massey stated to keep in mind in keeping low levy rate, we still have to be able to offer services and economic development. Jensen stated again not to take away any personnel, they need that, and he doesn't think it will be so tight next year, property values could be up. Mayor stated we have done an admiral job in keeping our tax levy down over the years. Mayor stated taxable value increased to \$215,479,477. Dale asked Jensen if he had other ideas to bring more inventory in? Wickersham asked about Teton and Hardin being annexed. Dodson stated we could do annexation. Jensen said the Economic person could show that potential developer what Payette has to offer. Wickersham asked if we locked in on health insurance plan and was stated yes. Massey asked about strategic plan next Monday and would like to see a work session after that. Cordova wanted to recap what the Council wanted: leave \$10,000 for fuel tank, get rid of dog park and use Padgett Park and leave \$5,000, leave 3% raise for employees. How would we do not do a 3% across the board. Dodson stated maybe some employees get 5% and some might get ½ %. Dale asked where we rank in the state on tax levy and Jensen stated 12 or 13. Dale asked about health insurance reimbursement. Dodson stated health insurance went down so could put more in the health insurance reimbursement fund. Cordova stated currently do not fund that account and it will be gone in a few years. Jensen asked about revolving loan, could we use some of that towards the Economic Development person. Cordova will check if it can used for that purpose.

A motion was made by Jensen and Dodson seconded to adjourn the regular meeting at 5:52 PM.







Hometown Heroes

Civic pride and spirit of volunteerism, instigated by Cliff Masingill, built Idaho's Scotch Pines Golf Course

The Greatest Generation weren't only brave warriors on the battlefield and through the depths of the Great Depression. Many were also hometown heroes with an abundance of dreams and civic pride. Like Cliff Masingill of Payette, Idaho.

Masingill, along with a small group of other dedicated friends and family members, designed and built Scotch Pines Golf Course, one of southwest Idaho's finer community courses. Cliff first proposed the idea of Payette having its own course back in 1960 while returning from a golf outing in Emmett, Idaho, a 45-minute drive each way.

"I didn't like traveling back and forth to other places and thought we could make it work," he recalled. "I thought it might be a good idea and I just kept talking it up."

Within a matter of months, the Payette Municipal Development Corporation (PMDC) was formed and Cliff voted in as its president.

Cliff and his brother Tobe constructed a plaster-of-Paris model of the proposed golf course, which was put on display at a local bank. Money was raised thanks to a dance and a casino night. A \$10,000 bank loan was also obtained and the project was off and running. The city of Payette had over 200 acres of undeveloped land north of town which was leased to the committee, which had to first clear the land of sagebrush and snakes, then figure out how to irrigate the high desert terrain adequately.

Luckily, Cliff's father Tollie was in the pump business, but the work itself was time-consuming and often back-breaking anyway. An all-volunteer crew worked nights and weekends clearing land, digging trenches, and laying yards and yards of irrigation pipe.

"Some of the guys who helped didn't even play golf, but they knew this would

benefit the town," recalls Cliff.

The PMDC consulted a supposed expert to help with the layout of the course, then rejected some of his ideas. Cliff remembers one incident to this day. "On the first hole the tee shot had to be short, then the next shot had to be a long carry over the reservoir. I can still hear my brother Tobe saying, 'There isn't another hole in existence worse than that one.'" Needless to say Cliff and company changed that.

By late 1962, "We were in a real rush to get the pipe and sprinklers in," said Cliff, and they did in time for Scotch Pines' first season in 1963 with approximately 50 members. Their design worked too, because seven holes today are virtually the same as they were originally laid out.

"I was very happy," Cliff says with a big smile. "We thought if we had nine holes we had what we wanted." But so many golfers started playing Scotch Pines that those thoughts had to be modified.

"We had guys fighting over tee times so we had to open our second nine," he said. The second nine was opened for play in 1988, also

built with volunteers, although the price tag was much higher than the original \$35,000 that was spent on the original nine.

Cliff, now 89 years young, was asked about the town's accomplishment and could it be done in today's world. "It was worth it. I thought it would be good for the town," he noted. "But there's no way you could get the volunteers for this type of thing today."

His son Scott agrees. "It's a different world today," says Scott, the nine-time Idaho State Amateur champion and 2003 inductee into the Pacific Northwest Golf Hall of Fame, and who now sits on the PPGA Board of Directors.

After serving 35 years as the president of the course's board of directors, Cliff just

plays golf these days either with his "over the hill gang" or with Scott and other family members. When he plays with his son, Cliff plays from the silver tees while Scott bangs away from the blues.

Both Masingills talked about their favorite sport. "It's a neat sport health-wise if nothing else; I mean, look at me," says Cliff.

"Such a diversity of ages can play," Scott added. "Where else can you spend four hours with your dad, grandson, or daughter? It's a great common bonding experience."

Like his father before him, Scott is now currently the president of the course's board of directors and is proud that Scotch Pines has kept to its original goal of welcoming all golfers regardless of age or skill level. "The golf course was designed so beginners can play it and it's still that way," he said. "We want to include everybody."

He and other local residents have the members of the Greatest Generation to thank for that.

- A. An application by ABC Storages for a Conditional Use Permit to occupy existing living space for onsite manager at the property located at 1105 S. Main St., West slope Tax 157 in BLK 39. The property is zoned C2 Commercial.

Cody Joplin, 9707 Gurdon Drive Boise, ID, addressed the Commission. Mr. Joplin stated that ABC Storages new owners are wanting to utilize the current living space above the main office building

for an onsite manager. No families will be living in the facility nor will it be rented out. It will specifically be used for the onsite managers. Mr. Choate asked if the upstairs is set up for a residence. Mr. Joplin stated yes, it is already an existing living space.

Public Hearing closed at 6:10 pm

AGENDA ITEMS

- A. An application by ABC Storages for a Conditional Use Permit to occupy existing living space for onsite manager at the property located at 1105 S. Main St.

Mr. Choate stated we have visited this exact request in previous years. At that initial request, there was some controversy, but at this time he does not see any problem with it if it is only used for the onsite managers. Ms. Cordova stated that yes, this has been requested before and she suggests having our Fire Chief & Building Inspector, inspect the living space to make sure it is up to code.

A motion was made by Franklin and seconded by Henderson to approve the Conditional Use Permit for ABC Storage to occupy existing living space for onsite manager with the following conditions:

1. Follow Federal, State and local regulations.
2. Will be revisited upon complaint.

After unanimous voice vote, motion CARRIED

- B. Non-Conforming Lots- Ms. Cordova wanted to present a small change to the non-conforming ordinance in regards to residential rebuild in a residential zone to clarify the zonings and rebuild regulations. The Commission accepted the proposed change and stated to continue to move forward.
- C. Utility Pole Height – Ms. Cordova stated that in the recent months the City has received a lot of requests in regards to companies wanting to put different types of utility poles/ towers within the City Limits Right now the City's only option is to have the applicant go through the Conditional Use Permit process to get approved or not. Ms. Cordova asked the Commission if this is something they would like to regulate and restrict to specific zones in the community. Ms. Henderson stated yes, this is a very good idea due to so many companies using utility poles/ towers these days. Her parents currently have one in the line of sight and is an eye sore. Making this a non-permitted use in residential zones would be beneficial for our community. Ms. Cordova presented the code on wireless

towers and poles from the City of Jerome. Ms. Cordova stated she would draft something up to bring back to the commission.

- D. An application for a Conditional Use Permit from the County for a dog kennel/breeding facility for Mandy Nelsen at 8975 Washoe Road Payette, ID.

Mr. Choate stated judging by how big the property is and how far it is in the Impact area he doesn't see a problem with it. Ms. Cordova stated that currently in the City Code doesn't allow for kennels, but if they do have one there are strict rules they have to adhere by. The Comprehensive Map shows this area as a Development Reserve. Development Reserve is for future development of commercial businesses, which this type of use would be permitted. Ms. Childers stated that the only thing she wanted the applicant to know is that the City has prohibited breeds. Ms. Cordova stated the County also has breed regulations.

A motion was made by Franklin to send a favorable recommendation to Payette County Planning & Zoning Commission to approve the Conditional Use Permit by Mandy Nelsen for a dog kennel/ breeding facility at the property located at 8975 Washoe Road. The motion was seconded by Henderson.

After unanimous voice vote, motion CARRIED

- E. An application for a Conditional Use Permit from the County for an in-home salon for Adam & Angie Ryneason at 10904 Scotch Pines Road.

Mr. Choate stated this type of use would fall under home occupations. The Comprehensive Map shows this property as a low density residential. Even then it would require a conditional use permit. Mr. Choate doesn't see a problem, but would suggest that the applicant follows the home occupation guidelines.

Chapter 17.22 PERSONAL WIRELESS FACILITIES, SPIRES, POLES, ANTENNAS, STEEPLES, TOWERS, AND OTHER SUCH STRUCTURES

17.22.010: PURPOSE:

- A. To accommodate the communication needs of residents and businesses while protecting the public health, safety, and general welfare of the community, regulations regarding personal wireless facilities, spires, poles, antennas, steeples, towers, and other such structures are necessary in order to:
1. Facilitate the provision of wireless telecommunication services to the residents and businesses of the city;
 2. Minimize adverse visual effects of spires, poles, antennas, steeples, towers, and other such structures through careful design and siting standards;
 3. Avoid potential damage to adjacent properties from spire, pole, antenna, steeple, tower, and other such structures' failure, through structural standards and setback requirements; and
 4. Maximize the use of existing and approved towers and buildings to accommodate new wireless telecommunication antennas in order to reduce the number of towers needed to serve the community. (Ord. 1070, 2010)

17.22.020: TOWERS IN ZONING DISTRICTS:

A. Residential (R) Districts:

1. On residentially zoned parcels, towers supporting amateur radio antennas shall not be permitted in the front, side or street side yard.
2. Personal wireless facilities shall be prohibited in all residential (R) zones.

B. PS (Public/Semipublic) District:

5. Existing or approved towers and buildings within the search radius cannot accommodate the planned equipment at a height necessary to function reasonably as documented by a qualified and licensed professional engineer.
 6. Other unforeseen reasons that make it unfeasible to locate the planned telecommunications equipment upon an existing or approved tower or building as documented by a qualified and licensed professional engineer, or other professional qualified to provide necessary documentation.
- C. Any proposed commercial wireless telecommunication service tower shall be designed, structurally, electrically, and in all respects, to accommodate both the applicant's antennas and comparable antennas for at least two (2) additional users if the tower is over one hundred ten feet (110') in height, for at least one additional user if the tower is over fifty feet (50') in height.
 - D. Towers must be designed to allow for future rearrangement of antennas upon the tower and to accept antennas mounted at varying heights.
 - E. Personal wireless facilities proposed at a location which has an approved special use permit (approved after the effective date hereof) for an existing facility which was required to allow collocation shall not be required to obtain a separate special use permit as long as all the requirements of the previously approved special use permit will be complied with. Design review, and subsequent building permit, will be required for any such proposal. (Ord. 1070, 2010)

17.22.040: TOWER AND ANTENNA DESIGN REQUIREMENTS:

- A. All personal wireless facilities shall be required to obtain design review approval prior to construction.
- B. Towers and antennas shall be required to blend into the surrounding environment through the use of color and camouflaging architectural treatment, except in instances where the color is dictated by federal or state authorities such as the federal aviation administration.

- C. Towers shall be set back from all existing public right of way lines (or planned right of way lines if additional height is to be acquired in the future) by a minimum distance equal to twice the height of the tower including all antennas and attachments. If this requirement conflicts with other setback requirements of this code the setback with the greater distance shall prevail, except as may be allowed in subsection E of this section.
- D. Towers shall not be located between a principal structure and a public street.
- E. A tower's setback may be reduced or its location in relation to a public street varied, at the sole discretion of the commission, to allow the integration of a tower into an existing or proposed structure such as a church steeple, light standard, power line support device, or similar structure. (Ord. 1070, 2010)

17.22.060: TOWER LIGHTING, SIGNAGE, AND ATTACHMENTS:

- A. No antenna or tower shall have affixed or attached to it in any way, except during time of repair or installation, any stationary lights, strobe lights, reflectors, flashers, or other illuminating device, except as specifically required by the federal aviation administration, federal communications commission, or other federal or state authority.
- B. When incorporated into the approved design of the tower, light fixtures used to illuminate ball fields, parking lots, or similar areas may be attached to the tower if approved by the commission.
- C. The use of any portion of a tower for signs, other than warning or equipment information signs, is prohibited.
- D. No tower shall have constructed thereon, or attached thereto, in any way, any platform, catwalk, crow's nest, or like structure, except during periods of construction or repair. (Ord. 1070, 2010)

2. Place antennas and towers in districts zoned central business district (CBD) which do not adjoin or adversely impact residential neighborhoods.
3. Place antennas on appropriate existing structures, such as buildings, communications towers, water towers, and smokestacks in other zoned districts.
4. Place antennas and towers on other private nonresidential property.
5. Place antennas and towers in residential districts only if locations for which a need has been demonstrated are not available on existing structures or in nonresidential districts.
6. Place antennas and towers on public property.

An applicant for a new antenna support structure to be located in a residential zoning district shall demonstrate that a diligent effort has been made to locate the proposed communications facilities on a government structure, a private institutional structure, or other appropriate existing structures within a nonresidential zoning district, and that due to valid considerations including physical constraints, and economic or technological feasibility, no appropriate location is available. The telecommunications company is required to demonstrate that it contacted the owners of tall structures within a one mile radius of the site proposed, asked for permission to install the antenna on those structures, and was denied for reasons other than economic ones. The information submitted by the applicant shall include a map of the area to be served by the tower, its relationship to other antenna sites in the applicant's network, and an evaluation of existing buildings taller than twenty feet (20'), communications towers and water tanks within one mile of the proposed tower.

- B. Priority Of Users: Priority for the use of city owned land for antennas and towers will be given to the following entities in descending order:
1. City of Jerome;
 2. Public safety agencies, including law enforcement, fire, and ambulance services, which are not part of the city and private entities with a public safety agreement with the city;
 3. Other governmental agencies, for uses which are not related to public safety; and
 4. Entities providing licensed commercial wireless telecommunication services including cellular, personal communication services (PCS), specialized mobilized radio (SMR), enhanced specialized mobilized radio (ESMR), paging, and similar services that are marketed to the general public.

- C. Minimum Requirements: The placement of antennas or towers on city owned property must comply with the following requirements:

d. The presence of the facility will not be harmful to the health of workers maintaining the water tower or reservoir.

E. Application Process: All applicants who wish to locate an antenna or tower on city owned property must submit to the administrator a completed application and detailed plan that complies with the submittal requirements of this chapter, this title, and other provisions of this code, along with other pertinent information requested by the city.

F. Termination: The council may cancel any lease if it determines that any one of the following conditions exist:

1. A potential user with a higher priority cannot find another adequate location and the potential use would be incompatible with the existing use;
2. A user's frequency broadcast unreasonably interferes with other users of higher priority, regardless of whether or not this interference was adequately predicted in the technical analysis; or
3. A user violates any of the standards in this chapter or the conditions attached to the city's lease or other authorization.

Before acting, the city will provide notice to the user of the intended termination and the reasons for it, and provide an opportunity for the user to address the council regarding the proposed action. This procedure need not be followed in emergencies.

G. Reservation Of Right: Notwithstanding the above, the council reserves the right to deny, for any reason, the use of any or all city owned property by any one or all applicants. (Ord. 1070, 2010)

17.22.100: ADDITIONAL APPLICATION SUBMITTAL REQUIREMENTS:

A. In addition to the information required elsewhere in this title, development applications for personal wireless facilities, shall include the following supplemental information:

1. Documentation from a qualified and licensed professional engineer showing that the proposed facility will be in compliance with the FCC standards regarding radio frequency (RF) emissions.
2. A report from a qualified and licensed professional engineer which describes the tower height and design (including a cross section and elevation); documents the height

B. A building/zoning permit shall not be required for antennas and/or towers erected temporarily for test purposes, for emergency communication, or for broadcast remote pick up operations. Temporary antennas shall be permitted for a maximum of seventy two (72) hours unless specifically approved otherwise by the commission.

C. In addition to the findings required and conditions permitted for special use permits, in chapter 17.60 of this title, the commission shall make an additional finding concerning the duration of the special use permit. Upon finding that the special use permit is to be limited in duration, a condition limiting the duration and the basis for such a condition shall be included within the findings of fact and conclusions of law for the special use permit. (Ord. 1070, 2010)

17.22.120: ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING:

- A. All personal wireless facilities requiring a special use permit shall comply with the special use notice requirements within this code with the following additional requirements:
1. All property owners within five hundred feet (500') of an R-1, R-2, R-3, R-M and C-1, C-2, C-3, CBD, NS seven hundred fifty feet (750') BP, PS, MU, AB, one thousand feet (1,000') and M-1, M-2 one thousand five hundred feet (1,500') of all property lines of the site (or lease boundary lines, if applicable) shall be notified of the public hearing by the city, by mail, a minimum of fifteen (15) days before the scheduled public hearing. The applicant will be required to provide the names of the property owners to the city.
 2. Any required public notice signs, to be located on a proposed site, shall be required to comply with the requirements for posting of a rezone/subdivision (minimum size of sign face to be 4 feet wide by 4 feet high). (Ord. 1070, 2010)

17.22.130: RESTRICTED AREAS:

- A. Telecommunications towers in excess of thirty five feet (35') in height shall not be permitted within the "restricted area for telecommunications towers" as shown on exhibit A attached to the ordinance codified herein. (Ord. 1070, 2010)

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PAYETTE, IDAHO, AMENDING THE PAYETTE MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 17.32.030 IN CHAPTER 17.32 OF TITLE 17, 17.34.030 IN CHAPTER 17.34 OF TITLE 17, AND 17.36.030 IN CHAPTER 17.36 OF TITLE 17 BY ALLOWING LICENSEE TO OPERATE UPON EXISTING LICENSED PREMISES WITHOUT OBTAINING A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT; SETTING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; ALLOWING PUBLICATION IN SUMMARY FORM; ESTABLISHING SEVERABILITY; ESTABLISHING A REPEALER; PROVIDING A PENALTY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF PAYETTE, IDAHO:

Section 1. Section 17.32.030, 17.34.030 and 17.36.030 of Title 17, Chapter 17.32, Chapter 17.34 and Chapter 17.36 of the Payette Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

17.32.030: CONDITIONAL USES:

The following uses may be permitted by the planning and zoning commission after public notice has been given by United States mail to all property owners within three hundred feet (300') of the property in question and a public hearing is held. The planning and zoning commission may require appropriate safeguards and special conditions as said commission deems necessary. Such uses and buildings must be appropriately located and designed to meet a community need without adversely affecting the neighborhood.

Uses permitted in A residential districts and in B residential districts. Any permitted residential use shall meet the residential zoning standards as specified in the A residential and B residential zoning regulations.

Churches.

Dance halls.

Drinking establishments that serve beer, wine or liquor for on site consumption. **Provided, however, in the event a drinking establishment license is being transferred to a new owner within 90 days from the date the current owner ceases doing business, a conditional use permit will not be required. If there is any change in the use, including, but not limited to, hours of operation, size, capacity, type of drinking establishment, or entertainment then the transfer shall be subject to receiving a new conditional use permit.**

Light manufacturing, which is not dangerous or offensive on account of dust, gas or smoke and noise.

Manufactured home parks. Because of increased residential density in a manufactured home park, commercial uses allowed in commercial zones will not be permitted within a manufactured home park.

Residential use directly connected to the business including, but not limited to, motel residences, security housing, office/residence setups. Such residences shall meet all standards for residences as specified in the B residential district.

Warehouses used for storage of merchandise that is sold at retail on the premises to the ultimate consumer, excluding mail order warehouses.

Warehouses used for storage of personal property not intended for sale. (Ord. 1330, 2010)

17.34.030: CONDITIONAL USES:

The following uses may be permitted by the planning and zoning commission after public notice has been given by United States mail to all property owners within three hundred feet (300') of the property in question and a public hearing is held. The planning and zoning commission may require appropriate safeguards and special conditions as said commission deems necessary. Such uses and buildings must be appropriately located and designed to meet a community need without adversely affecting the neighborhood.

All conditional uses as allowed in a C commercial district.

Drinking establishments that serve beer, wine or liquor for on site consumption. **Provided, however, in the event a drinking establishment license is being transferred to a new owner within 90 days from the date the current owner ceases doing business, a conditional use permit will not be required. If there is any change in the use, including, but not limited to, hours of operation, size, capacity, type of drinking establishment, or entertainment then the transfer shall be subject to receiving a new conditional use permit.**

Residential use. (Ord. 1204, 2002)

17.36.030: CONDITIONAL USES:

The following uses may be permitted by the planning and zoning commission after public notice has been given by United States mail to all property owners within three hundred feet (300') of the property in question and a public hearing is held. The planning and zoning commission may require appropriate safeguards and special conditions as said commission deems necessary. Such uses and buildings must be appropriately located and designed to meet a community need without adversely affecting the neighborhood.

Drinking establishments that serve beer, wine or liquor for on site consumption. **Provided, however, in the event a drinking establishment license is being transferred to a new owner within 90 days from the date the current owner ceases doing business, a conditional use permit will not be required. If there is any change in the use, including, but not limited to, hours of operation, size, capacity, type of drinking establishment, or entertainment then the transfer shall be subject to receiving a new conditional use permit.**

Fuel yards.

Section 6. Any violation of this ordinance shall be a misdemeanor.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PAYETTE, IDAHO, AMENDING THE PAYETTE MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 17.56.060 IN CHAPTER 17.56 OF TITLE 17 BY ADDING A NEW SUB-SECTION 1, EXCEPTIONS; SETTING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; ALLOWING PUBLICATION IN SUMMARY FORM; ESTABLISHING SEVERABILITY; ESTABLISHING A REPEALER.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF PAYETTE, IDAHO:

Section 1. Section 17.56.060 of Title 17, Chapter 17.56 of the Payette Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

17.56.060: RESTORATION PERMISSIBLE WHEN:

Nothing in this title shall prevent the reconstruction, repairing, rebuilding and continued use of any nonconforming building or structure damaged by fire, collapse, explosion or act of God, subsequent to the effective date of the provisions codified in this chapter, wherein the expense of such work does not exceed sixty percent (60%) of the actual value of the building or structure at the time such damage occurred. Provided, however, in the case of a residential property in a non-residential zone, if the structure can be rebuilt on exactly the same footprint as the damaged building, then reconstruction of the dwelling shall be allowed provided the rebuilt structure conforms to all current building and fire codes. Provided, further, however, in the case of damage exceeding sixty percent (60%) of the value of a residential dwelling which is located in a commercially zoned area, where the structure cannot be re-built on exactly the same footprint, the owner shall be allowed to rebuild the structure provided the rebuilt/replacement structure complies with the most current residential setback requirements and the building permit is applied for and construction commences within one year of the damage.

1. In the event the planning administrator, or a designee, finds that:

a. Commercial or industrial uses have developed or are developing in the zone, and

b. A majority of the abutting property owners or their representatives are opposed to a continuation of the use of the structure as a principal residence then a rebuild permit shall not be issued without a public hearing before the city council.

c. When requesting a permit for a rebuild or if seeking a rebuild letter, an applicant shall supply the administrator with written statements from the abutting property owners or their representatives which indicate whether the abutting landowners oppose or favor the request.

Section 2. This Ordinance may be published in summary form allowed by Idaho Code.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon passage and publication as required by the laws of the State of Idaho.

Section 4. Any ordinances or resolutions which are in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed, but only insofar as the conflict exists.

Section 5. If any portion of this Ordinance should be found to be unconstitutional or unenforceable for any reason, the remainder of the Ordinance shall be applied to effectuate the purposes of this Ordinance.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF PAYETTE, IDAHO:

Section 1. Section 5.10.020 of Title 5, Chapter 5.10 of the Payette Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Chapter 5.10 OPEN CONTAINERS OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR ON PUBLIC WAYS

5.10.010: DEFINITION:

5.10.020: CONSUMPTION:

5.10.030: OPEN CONTAINER:

5.10.040: LICENSEE NOT TO PERMIT REMOVAL OF OPEN CONTAINER:

5.10.050: OPEN CONTAINER IN MOTOR VEHICLES:

5.10.060: PENALTY:

5.10.010: DEFINITION:

As used in this chapter, the following term has the following meaning: "Alcoholic liquor" means any spirits, wine, beer, ale or other liquid containing more than one-half of one percent (0.50%) of alcohol by volume, which is fit for beverage purposes or intended for beverage purposes.

5.10.020: CONSUMPTION:

Except as permitted in Chapter 12 of Title 5 of the Payette Municipal Code, no ~~No~~ person shall consume any alcoholic liquor while in or upon public streets, alleys, sidewalks, parking lots, or other public way

5.10.030: OPEN CONTAINER:

Except as permitted in Chapter 12 of Title 5 of the Payette Municipal Code, no ~~No~~ person shall be in possession of any glass, can or open container containing alcoholic liquor on any thoroughfare, street, sidewalk, alleys, parking lots or any other public way.

5.10.040: LICENSEE NOT TO PERMIT REMOVAL OF OPEN CONTAINER:

Except as permitted in Chapter 12 of Title 5 of the Payette Municipal Code, no ~~No~~ person, firm or corporation licensed to sell alcoholic liquor, or his employees or agents, shall permit any person to remove from such premises, any alcoholic liquor in any open container.

5.10.050: OPEN CONTAINER IN MOTOR VEHICLES:

No person shall have in his or her possession an open container containing alcoholic liquor within or on a motor vehicle, including motorcycles, while parked or standing on a public street or public parking lot in the city, or while such vehicle is in motion. (Ord. 934, 1982)

5.10.060: PENALTY:

Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 2. Chapter 5.12.020 of the Payette Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

**Chapter 5.12
EATING AND DRINKING ESTABLISHMENTS**

5.12.010: ADOPTION OF IDAHO FOOD CODE:

5.12.0430: VIOLATION; PENALTY:

5.12.010: ADOPTION OF IDAHO FOOD CODE:

The definitions, the inspection of food service establishments, the issuance, suspension and revocation of permits to operate food service establishments, the prohibiting of the sale of adulterated or misbranded food or drink, the enforcement of this chapter shall, except where provisions in this chapter conflict, be regulated in accordance with the most recent version of the "Idaho food code" as adopted by the state of Idaho. (Ord. 1357, 2012)

5.12.020 – SIDEWALK CAFES AND OUTDOOR DINING, IN THE C-1 DOWNTOWN COMMERCIAL DISTRICT:

a. Sidewalk cafes and outdoor dining areas are designed to allow uses on public property in locations where they are determined to be appropriate by the City of Payette, and promote and protect the public health, safety, and general welfare of the community. These general goals include, among others, the following specific purposes:

- (1) To attract residents and nonresidents to downtown Payette;
- (2) To provide an additional way for restaurants or food establishments to expand their operations;
- (3) To promote sidewalk cafes and outdoor dining as useful and properly planned visual amenities;
- (4) To provide adequate space for pedestrians on the sidewalk adjacent to sidewalk cafes and outdoor dining and to ensure access to adjacent commercial and retail uses;
- (5) To provide for penalties for violations of this chapter.

b. Upon an application being made to Administration, and in compliance with the other requirements of this code, the City of Payette may issue a temporary use permit providing for the placement thereon of tables, chairs, umbrellas, fencing, outdoor receptacles, or other related articles. Applications for permits shall be reviewed and approved by city staff in accordance with all city ordinances, City of Payette sidewalk café & outdoor dining design guidelines, building and fire codes, and all other applicable laws and ordinances. All fees if any shall be payable in advance of any permits being issued.

c. In the event a permit is issued, the permit shall expire on the expiration date set out on the permit whether issued by the City or by the state department of health or the Southwest Health District. A permit application available from the City of Payette, shall include, but shall not necessarily be limited to, the following information:

- (1) Name of applicant and business;
- (2) Address of the business;
- (3) Address of the applicant;
- (4) Telephone number of the applicant and business;
- (5) Name of the property owner if other than applicant;
- (6) Address of the property owner if other than applicant;
- (7) Telephone number of the property owner if other than applicant;
- (8) Proposed start and end date;
- (9) Proposed hours of operation;
- (10) Proposed number of tables, chairs, railings, posts, table umbrellas or other items;
- (11) Proposed color, design, materials, and workmanship of tables, chairs, railings, post, table umbrellas or other items;
- (12) Proposed area of occupancy including square feet and dimensions;
- (13) Whether alcohol will be served;
- (14) Copy of certificate of insurance;
- (15) Whether permit application is a new application or renewal; if renewal, applicant shall describe any changes from the previous application;
- (16) Written authorization from the owner of the property shall be required where the applicant is not the owner of the affected property.

d. **Standards:** Cafes and outdoor seating shall only be permitted where it is determined that the use will not create a hazard, a sight distance obstruction for motor vehicle operators, nor unduly impede pedestrian traffic. Conditions, specific to the operation of a business may be incorporated into the permit as required by city staff. All sidewalk cafes and outdoor seating are subject to the requirements as listed within the City of Payette sidewalk café & outdoor dining design guidelines.

1. An applicant may not use the permitted space for any purpose other than the authorized purpose stated on the application. The City of Payette may issue such regulations as it may deem necessary to limit the impact of the proposed use on the general public, un-related businesses and others who may require access into the impacted areas.

E. **Revocation:** Payette Police Department or its designee shall have the authority to revoke the permit for unauthorized use or a violation of any of the provisions of Payette City Code. Upon revocation, the applicant shall not be entitled to any refund for fees assessed under this chapter. After the revocation of a permit, in the event a permit holder desires to continue the use allowed herein, a permit holder must submit an application for a new permit under the same requirements for the original permit.

Section 3: Section 5.12.020 of the Payette Municipal Code is hereby renumbered to become section 5.12.030.

5.12.0320: PERMIT; REQUIRED; FEE; EXPIRATION:

The city clerk shall be the health authority and, before a permit is issued to an applicant desiring to operate a food service establishment, a fee as set by resolution, shall be paid and the applicant shall have already secured a permit to operate a food service establishment from the state department of health. The permit issued shall expire on the date of the expiration of the permit issued by the state department of health. (Ord. 1371, 2012)

Section 4: Section 5.12.030 of the Payette Municipal Code is hereby renumbered to become section 5.12.040

5.12.0430: VIOLATION; PENALTY:

Any violation of this chapter shall be a misdemeanor punishable by fine and/or imprisonment up to, but not exceeding, the maximum penalties set forth in Idaho Code sections 18-113 and 50-302. In addition, thereto, such persons may be enjoined from continuing such violations. Each day upon which such a violation occurs constitutes a separate violation. (Ord. 1357, 2012)

ORDINANCE 1414

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PAYETTE, IDAHO, AMENDING THE PAYETTE MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 12.16.020 INCREASING THE NUMBER OF PERSONS FROM 50 TO 199 BEFORE A RESERVATION IS REQUIRED; ALLOWING FOR RESERVATIONS IN CITY PARKS; SETTING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; ALLOWING PUBLICATION IN SUMMARY FORM; ESTABLISHING SEVERABILITY; ESTABLISHING A REPEALER; PROVIDING A PENALTY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF PAYETTE, IDAHO:

Section 1. Section 12.16.020 of Title 12, Chapter 12.16. of the Payette Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Chapter 12.16 PARKS AND PUBLIC PROPERTY

12.16.020: PARKS; ASSEMBLIES; LICENSE REQUIRED; PROCEDURE:

A. It is unlawful for any person to be among an assembly of more than one hundred ninety nine (199) ~~fifty (50)~~ or more persons within any public park in the city, unless a license reservation for the general purpose of said assembly has been issued permitting an assembly of a definite number of persons, which number exceeds or equals the number actually present at the assembly.

B. All applications for a license reservation required under this section shall be made to the council, City Hall which shall issue a license reservation for requested area of a City Park. The day before the assembly the applicant will obtain signs from City Hall to be placed in the area that states the date and time of the assembly and that the area has been reserved. The signs will be returned to City Hall after the assembly has taken place. ~~limiting the number of persons in an assembly within a public park on the condition that the applicant is a responsible person of good character and that it is in the judgment of the council that the issuance of a license would not be detrimental to the public welfare. The council may revoke said license~~ The reservation may be revoked at any time should city officials it determine that it would be in the best interest of the public welfare that said reservation license be revoked.

C. The license reservation fee shall be set by resolution for each multiple of fifty (50) persons for which the license reservation is issued, and said license reservation shall state generally the reason for the assembly and the time and date it shall be effective. Non-profit groups who provide proof of status are exempt from the reservation fee.

D. Provisions contained elsewhere in this code for the issuance of licenses reservation to allow assemblies for specific purpose shall control in those cases and take precedence over the provisions in this section.

Section 2. This Ordinance may be published in summary form allowed by Idaho Code.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon passage and publication as required by the laws of the State of Idaho.

Section 4. Any ordinances or resolutions which are in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed, but only insofar as the conflict exists.

Section 5. If any portion of this Ordinance should be found to be unconstitutional or unenforceable for any reason, the remainder of the Ordinance shall be applied to effectuate the purposes of this Ordinance.

Section 6. Any violation of this ordinance shall be a misdemeanor.

SIDEWALK CAFÉ & OUTDOOR DINING DESIGN GUIDELINES

Introduction

The City of Payette recognizes the importance of outdoor dining to the vitality and success of our Downtown (C-1) Zone. These design guidelines are in place to promote the health, safety and welfare of our residents, businesses and visitors. All sidewalk cafes and outdoor dining facilities are subject to the City of Payette Ordinances, all applicable Building Codes, Fire Codes, Americans with Disabilities Act, and the State of Idaho Liquor regulations.

Purpose

These guidelines provide standards for outdoor dining areas throughout the Downtown Zone (C-1 Zone) with special attention to those dining areas in high visibility areas within the public right-of-way. Central to the process of allowing outdoor dining areas is the necessity of ensuring furniture and other items placed along the street positively contribute to the historic character of Downtown Payette.

The guidelines apply to all sidewalk cafes and outdoor dining facilities approved by the City of Payette. Failure to comply with these requirements constitutes a violation of Payette City Code.

Definitions

1. **Limit Line:** Area approved by the City of Payette to be occupied for an outdoor seating/dining/event use. Such area may be on sidewalks, where sidewalks are wide enough to accommodate the requested use plus space required for the pedestrian zone. Such pedestrian zone shall comply with the ANSI standards for accessibility, but in no case be less than five (5) feet in width. Areas located within on-street parking stalls shall in no case take up more than twelve (12) feet of the length of such stalls.
2. **Fence Line or Perimeter Fence:** A fence enclosing an outdoor seating/dining/event area, which may be on or within the limit line.

Other Regulations

City of Payette and the State of Idaho have adopted regulations that may apply to outdoor dining areas and seating areas. These may include, but may not be limited to:

- Alcoholic Beverages
- Sidewalk Café and Outdoor Dining
- Noise Regulations
- City Ordinances
- Sign Regulations
- State of Idaho Alcoholic Beverages (Title 23)

References are made to some of these regulations in these standards are for information purposes only. References are in italics. Not all regulations are referenced.

Business owners should consult City of Payette and the State of Idaho regarding regulations, permitting and license requirements. For the purpose of these standards, where these standards are more restrictive than the State of Idaho, these standards shall prevail.

Placement of Fences and Furnishings

✓ Placement of Fences

The distance from any fence used to enclose a café or outdoor seating area, which fence is parallel to the building face, shall not exceed the limit line unless otherwise specified.

✓ Placement of Furnishings/Accessories

All furnishings/accessories except certain umbrella shades, awning or canopy extensions and planters shall be placed within the perimeter fence surrounding the outdoor dining/seating/event area, if a fence is required/provided, or within the limit line if no fence is required or provided. The furnishings include but are not limited to benches, chairs, tables, umbrella bases, awnings and canopies, planters, trash receptacles, and all other accessories or equipment.

Umbrella stands and any umbrella shade that is less than six (6) feet, eight (8) inches in height at its lowest point from the walking surface shall be located inside the perimeter fence and the limit line. If an umbrella shade is at least six (6) feet, eight (8) inches in height at its lowest point from the walking surface, then the umbrella shade may extend outside the perimeter fence and the limit line.

Planters owned by the business owner/operator are permitted in the outdoor dining/event area at the discretion of the business owner/operator as long as they're within the limit line. If an outdoor dining/event area has a perimeter fence, planters are permitted outside the fence line if they are within the limit line. If a business owner/operator desires planters outside the perimeter fence or suspended from the outside edge of the perimeter fence, the fence shall be placed or configured so both the fence and the planters are within the limit line.

Awnings and canopies that are attached to the building and extend from the building face to the limit line may include an extension beyond the limit line if the extension is at least seven (7) feet in height from the walking surface. Extensions shall not exceed one-half (1/2) feet beyond the limit line.

Design Standards

✓ Fences

Each outdoor dining/event area where alcohol is served shall have a continuous fence around the perimeter except for one opening as required by Idaho State Code¹. Fences installed shall be of metal, and be black, antique brown or bronze in color. Fences shall be well-crafted and have a durable, professional finish. Prior to installing a fence, the

business owner/operator shall obtain approval from the City of Payette for the design, materials and construction specifications to be used for the fence.

Fences shall have sturdy support poles and bases that can withstand heavy jostling and bumping. The bases and fence layout shall be designed to create a stable enclosure without anchoring the fence to the ground. Attaching the fence to the ground is not allowed. Connections at corners shall be made so fence does not pull apart under normal use. Fences shall be a minimum of thirty-six (36) inches in height. Fences shall not create a continuous barrier more than four (4) feet in height. Fences shall be removable to accommodate events and change in seasons. Fences that run more or less parallel to the curb line shall be equidistant from the curb line with allowances for indentations at entrance points and for planters. Where no curb line exists, the fence should be equidistant from the building face. Fence placement shall not be slipshod. City of Payette may require a business owner/operator to adjust fence alignment to meet these standards.

Bases on support posts for fences may extend an additional one (1) foot outside the limit line if the base lies flat on the ground. Combining a fence with a support structure for an overhead awning or canopy is allowed if approved in writing by the City of Payette. Outdoor dining areas where alcohol is not served are not required to have a continuous fence, but must have fencing between all dining areas and adjacent parking stalls and the street. All furnishings other than umbrella shades and awning or canopy extensions shall be placed within the limit line.

✓ Sidewalks

A minimum of five (5) foot wide continuous pedestrian access along the public sidewalk free from all obstructions is required and must not create any pedestrian hazard.

✓ Umbrellas, awnings and canopies

Umbrellas, awnings and canopies shall be of cloth, and use colors that are in compliance with the Downtown Historic Guidelines and complementary to the aesthetics of the building it serves. Umbrellas and freestanding awnings or canopies shall be plain with no writing, graphics or advertising permitted. Umbrellas shall be securely anchored in stands. Awnings and canopies attached to the building may include the name of the business if this signage is approved by the City of Payette as an allowed tenant identification sign and the proper sign permits have been obtained. Awnings and canopies that are attached to the building and extend from the building face to the limit line as provided in the section of placement of furnishings.

✓ Planters

The design of planters owned by business owners/operators is at the discretion of the business owner/operator as long as they are placed within the limit line and are complimentary to the colors of the building exterior.

✓ Trash receptacles

Each outdoor dining area shall have a trash receptacle with a lid within the fence lines/limit lines.

✓ Signage

Signage shall not be posted on fencing surrounding outdoor areas except for signs required by law or for small informational signs, such as; "No smoking on patio". Sign banners are not permitted. A-frame and T-frames signs shall be located within the outdoor area limit line for the outdoor area to which they belong or in the furnishing zone directly in front of the outdoor area. All signage shall comply with the City of Payette regulations.

✓ Decorative Lighting

Lighting on fencing is permitted if the intent is to add a festive, decorative element and not to attract attention. Lighting shall be white or clear in color and shall be understated. Flashing lights are not allowed. Light strands shall be kept in good repair and burned out bulbs shall be replaced.

✓ Accessibility

Location and number of tables, spacing of tables and access within the outdoor dining area must meet all Building Code and Americans with Disabilities Act requirements.


✓ Maintenance

Business owners/operators shall be responsible for maintaining fences and furnishings in such a manner that these improvements present a high quality image. Any fences or furnishings showing signs of wear, damage or failure shall be promptly refurbished, repaired and/or replaced.

¹The State of Idaho Alcohol Commission requires that outdoor dining areas where alcohol is served must be separated from pedestrian areas by a continuous enclosure except for one entry point. Such outdoor dining areas must also be immediately adjacent to the establishment serving alcohol. Signage must be posted that alcohol cannot be taken off-premises.

- A. Hazardous Trees – The Commission discussed several trees in the City that home owners need letters sent to them located at 827 7th Ave. North, 442 N. 6th Street, 511 N. 7th Street, 504 N. 6th Street and 225 S. 9th Street. Fales will determine if all are in right of way and if so letter will be sent mid-September. Discussion also followed about the trees in our City parks that need attention. Fales stated that he can't water for a month before large equipment is on the grass. Fales stated he normally does this during fall cleanup. He also stated there is a Hawthorn in Central Park that he will be taking out this Fall. He stated some of the trees have been damaged by the new guys getting too close when mowing by the trees. The Commission is concerned that there are hazards about people's heads and they don't know about and needs to be taken care of. The money allocated for hazardous trees in the Parks budget has not been used. The total allocated is \$9,500. Mahler and Van Patten will try and get someone in our City parks before budget year ends. Fales stated he only has two full-time guys and wants it cleaned up by the tree service that does the trimming.
- B. The Commission discussed the new tree plotter program. Van Patten showed our City parks on the map with our parks. The trees are color coded for specific types.
